FROM THE CEO

Dear Friends,

Our 2022-2023 Annual Report is a document from a different time, even though it recounts a span of time that ended just a year ago. Over that span, COVID became a background fact instead of an ongoing crisis. The country pulled itself out of a financial downturn brought on by the pandemic. ASIA's service populations began growing rapidly as refugee numbers rebounded from the deep cuts made under the previous administration.

Over those twelve months, ASIA was able to build capacity while also safeguarding our resources. We accessed special funding streams set up to combat covid or regrow the economy. Knowing those monies would not last forever, our finance team built up substantial reserves.

Since my interim period started after the end of the last fiscal year, my experience reading this report is similar to yours. I'm pleased to see how much was accomplished over that period. All phases of our operations – medical, legal, social

services, children and youth, outreach and advocacy – saw successes that year and many saw growth.

At the same time, I see in this report the beginnings of the challenges that face us today. Needs are growing while many funding sources are constricting. We need to build capacity not only in terms of numbers of clients and patients that we can serve, but also in terms of linguistic and cultural competency as more refugees come from new hotspots in central Asia, the Middle East, Africa and South America.

ASIA is in good shape to meet these challenges but as always needs the support of the institutions and individuals who make up the broader ASIA family. On the horizon we see new opportunities along with potential pitfalls. Recalling how we emerged from the pandemic and economic downturn reminds us that we've met challenges before and can continue to do so in the future.

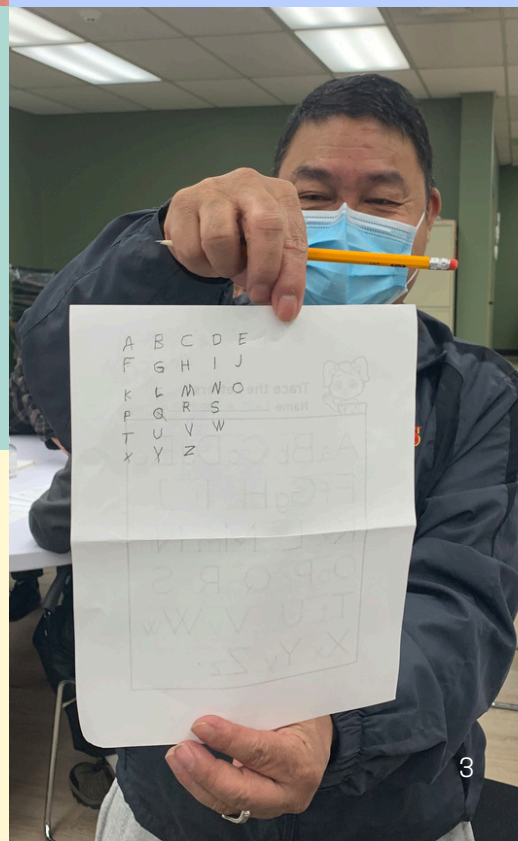

INDEPENDENCE & INSPIRATION

The vision for ASIA's wraparound services is to guide community members into full self-sufficiency and independence. This goal is especially important to our Ahimsa department, whose clients often come from abusive or controlling situations. Independence is more than something to take pride in—it is also safety and well-being.

Ditya* got married soon after coming to the United States. Her child has special needs that required her to stay home with them, so she did not have opportunities to immerse herself in American culture or community. She was completely reliant on her controlling husband. When she came to Ahimsa's team for help, she received assistance for family law, rent, case management, language interpretation, transportation, emotional support, and more to give herself and her child a better life.

Realizing how important it was to be self-sufficient, she started working, went to school, and learned how to navigate the city on her own. She continues to participate in Ahimsa's support groups to make friends with other survivors and embrace her newfound independence.

"I was inspired by you," she told her bilingual advocate.

BOOSTING CONFIDENCE WITH BOOKS

Daniel, a third grader in ASIA's Community Adult Mentorship program, would much rather play Uno than do his homework. He complained about having to read and was reluctant to choose books to read when they were offered to him. What he did enjoy was some healthy competition.

Cecily, ASIA's youth educator, appealed to Daniel's competitive streak to help him improve his reading abilities. She challenged him to read a book for thirty minutes and answer trivia questions about the story he read, such as the names of characters and their motivations. Correct answers won him high fives while incorrect answers came with playful banter and a rereading requirement. The challenge soon became a game as his initial disengagement gave way to excitement whenever he answered correctly, while some of his friends would gather around him and cheer him on.

Soon, he grew to look forward to his daily reading challenge. He would come into the program, loudly declaring "Your questions are too easy! Ms. Cecily, I'm gonna dominate today!" He chose his own books to read and answered difficult comprehensive reading questions. Through this reading exercise, **he gained confidence in reading and in himself.**

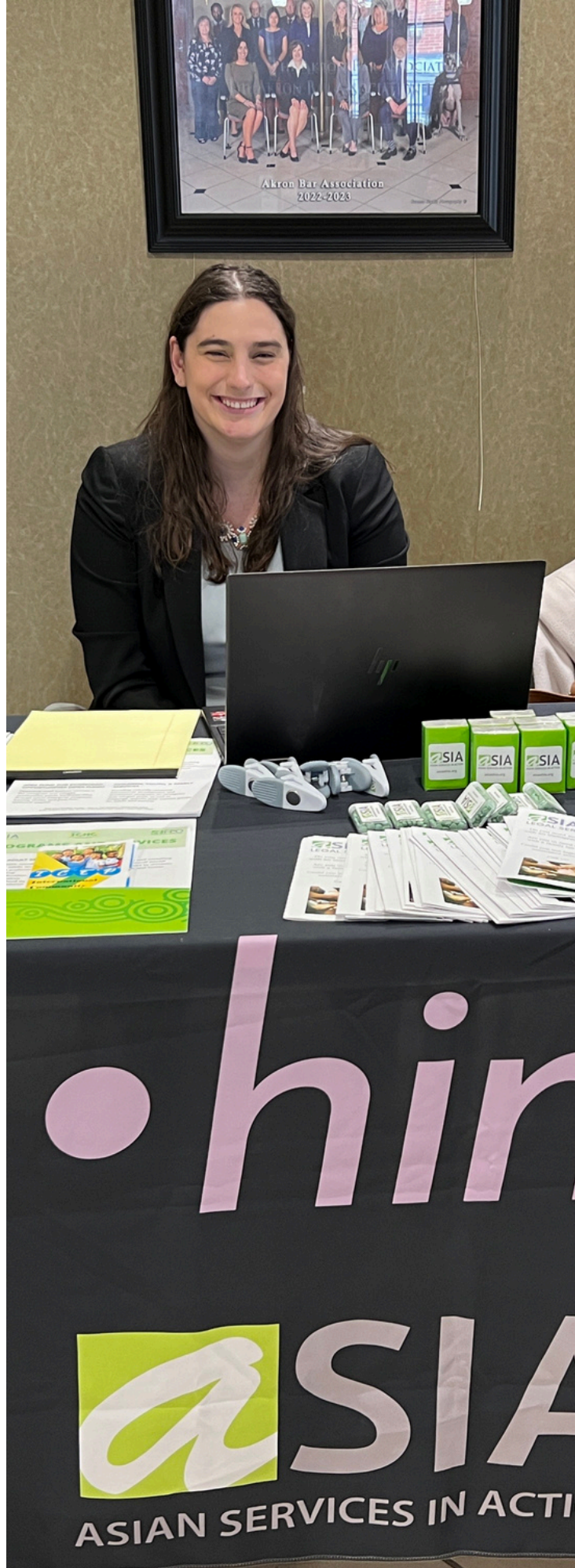

SUPPORTING OUR SENIORS



Maishori Kami initially resettled in New York with her son's family, but she was isolated. She could not apply for any benefits because of language barriers, and she was lonely. She had one daughter living in Akron, OH, who came to ASIA's Sustainability Services for guidance on how to move her mother to live with her.

Ms. Kami decided to move to Akron with the help of ASIA to apply for food stamps, Medicaid, and senior vouchers. We also helped her update her information with the Social Security Administration office, obtain a new state ID, find a primary physician, and receive emergency food, all in her native language. She now lives with her daughter and **is happy to call Akron her home.**

When **San Man Rai** first became a client of ASIA in 2013, he struggled with multiple health problems and could not apply for public benefits on his own. Over the next decade, ASIA's Aging & Adult Services team helped him open a bank account, find rental housing, apply for benefits (SNAP, Medicaid, SSI, home health care aide), health education, vaccines, apply for citizenship, and register to vote. Our interpretation services and bilingual staff assisted him so that he could understand and communicate with the aid he received.

Nearly ten years later, **he was proud to vote in Ohio's 2022 midterm elections and use his voice for his community.**





LANGUAGE ACCESS & DEMOCRACY

2023 kicked off with the Akron mayoral race as seven people announced their candidacy. The next mayor would determine Akron's future for all communities, including Akron's naturalized citizens. However, how does someone know who to vote for out of seven different candidates, especially if English is not your primary language?

ASIA's Community & Civic Engagement team was determined to connect candidates to community members. They organized two mayoral candidate forums, one in January and one in March, for community members to enjoy a free lunch, meet the candidates, and ask them questions about their plans for Akron. We arranged language interpreters to attend the event and interpret in Nepali, Ka'Ren, and other languages so that Limited English Proficient attendees could participate. The forums drew in approximately **200 attendees** of diverse backgrounds who asked questions to the candidates about police reform, housing equity, economic development, and more.

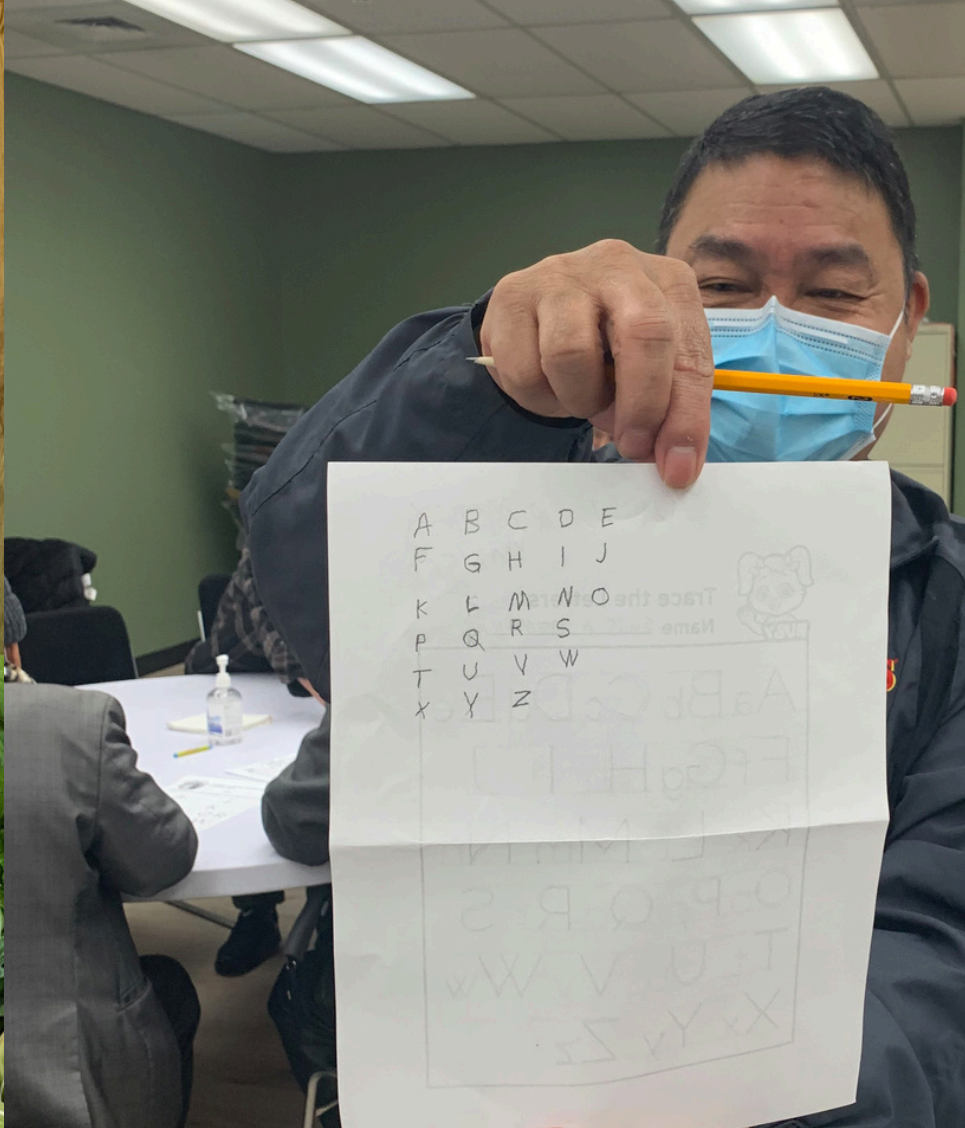


A FAMILY'S RECOVERY

Chan was twenty-seven when she arrived in the US after the military coup in Myanmar. She was so stressed about her parents' health problems and her future that she had little time and energy to take care of her own health.

Chan's mother had advanced heart failure that required open-heart surgery and heart valve replacement. The coup started soon after her surgery, so her family had to flee before full recovery. Chan's father endured torture and imprisonment, as well as malnutrition in the refugee camps. Her parents struggled with medical emergencies, infections, and chronic pain when they first arrived at ASIA's International Community Health Center (ICHC). The ICHC team rushed her mother to the ED to undergo treatment, subsequently following up with her closely to monitor her condition and address her concerns regarding her treatment and pacemaker. They also made arrangements for her father to receive physical therapy, orthopedic surgery, and neurological help.

Six months later, Chan's mother is in a stable condition and enjoys caring for her grandchildren, while her father's chronic pain has improved so that he can live more freely. Chan was finally able to get **peace of mind to focus on her health and career**. Now she works for ASIA's Apex Fund for Economic Opportunity and studies to become a nurse.



CELEBRATIONS AND APPRECIATIONS



CONGRATULATIONS, AHIMSA!



We are so proud of ASIA's Ahimsa team, who was awarded the **Purple Ribbon Award** in August of 2022. Their work in supporting domestic violence survivors in the community won them recognition from DomesticShelters.org, Alliance for HOPE and experts in the field. Ahimsa was awarded in the category of Most Innovative Service for their culturally humble approach to ending domestic violence.

THE JIN HUO SENIOR COMMUNITY CENTER



May Chen and CF Chen, founders of ASIA, converted ASIA's former office on Carroll Street into a senior adult daycare center to provide seniors a comfortable, multi-purpose space for activities, community, and programs.

The community center includes a board game room, exercise room, quiet rooms, and a kitchenette to serve hot meals.

The Jin Huo Senior Community Center officially opened in September of 2022 in partnership with ASIA. The Aging & Adult senior programs now fully take place in the community center where they enjoy a third space designed for their needs, interests, and community.

WOMEN AND LITERACY CLASSES



The first Women and Literacy class for Afghan women took place in June 2023! These classes take place both online and in person to teach Afghan women everyday English that they can use to ask for directions, shop for groceries, and meet new people. Our instructors also taught them how to navigate the internet, such as opening an email account or using Zoom, so that they could take these classes in the convenience of their homes. Since then, the class has grown and a literacy class for Afghan men is in the works. We are so proud of our students!

Chun Fu “CF” Chen and May Chen generously contributed \$25,000 to ASIA’s upcoming project of building a dental wing in ASIA’s International Community Health Center in Akron. CF founded Quatech, Inc., a company specializing in data communication, established the digital electronics program during his tenure as a professor at University of Akron, and co-formed Savile Lane with his daughter specializing in affordable custom-made clothing. May Chen is a co-founder and executive director emeritus of ASIA, and now dedicates her time to Jin Huo Community Senior Center.

We are so grateful for CF and May’s continuous and passionate investment in ASIA’s work and growth. Their dedication to the Asian American, Pacific Islander, refugee, and new immigrant communities span over twenty-five years of generosity of finances, time, and effort. We are preparing to develop strategies and collect information to address various challenges faced in our refugee communities, many of which trace back to behavioral health. One important challenge is strategizing how to de-stigmatize seeking behavioral health help.

There will be rising numbers of refugees that will be settled through established resettlement agencies in the area. We are also anticipating a new resettlement agency being established in the area, which will settle refugees into more nearby neighborhoods.

As we prepare to serve the new wave of community members coming to Northeast Ohio, we face the challenge of capacity building. More staff members, services, and language capabilities need to be established before the resettlement begins to best serve new community members. We increasingly rely on individual donations to prepare this capacity so that we will be ready to go as soon as the residents arrive.
